The boys are back! Twelve members of East Brunswick's Boy Scout Troop 223 just recently returned from a 14-day trip to Philmont Scout Ranch in Cimarron, New Mexico. Philmont Scout Ranch covers over 214 square miles of vast wilderness, making it the largest summer camp in the world.

While at Philmont, the Scouts participated in activities such as, hiking (over 71 miles in total, while carrying approximately 50 pounds of gear on their backs), climbing 4 peaks, rock climbing, black powder musket shooting, prospecting for gold, white water rafting and encounters with two bears along the way!

This high adventure trek also included a conservation project wherein the scouts cut down and cleared dead trees to help insure a healthy tree stand for future scouts. During the trek the crew members carried energy bars and protein enriched snacks for breakfast and lunch each day.

Dinners consisted of freeze dried meals cooked on small stoves, which they carried with them, and in line with the Boy Scout theme of "Leave No Trace" and Philmont Ranch's motto of "Take only pictures, leave only footprints," they left behind little or no evidence of their visit.

After such an eventful pilgrimage to this "Scouting paradise," these young men came home ready for hot showers, warm beds, and home cooked meals. They also came home with stories, and memories that will last a lifetime.
